



#### From Frying Pan to Fire: Increased Climate and ESG Litigation Risk Across Borders

As climate change accelerates, so does the prospect of ESG litigation around the world. In Europe, courts are finding that greenhouse gas emitters could be held liable for climate change impacts and that the failure to address climate change can violate the European Convention on Human Rights. In the United States, the Trump Administration is pursuing a strategy to reduce climate change regulation that could increase climate change litigation risk. #### Repatriating Looted and Stolen Art in a Changing Global Legal Landscape

This panel will explore the theft of art and especially state sponsored theft during the period 1933 – 1945, commonly referred to as "Nazi looted art" and the evolving challenges and legal frameworks surrounding the repatriation of stolen art. It examines the impact of recent U.S. legal developments, such as the U.S. HEAR ACT of 2016, California's 2024 statute and the Supreme Court's remand in the Cassirer case as well as other recent cases, which could shift the way courts handle Nazi looted art claims. It also highlights changes in Germany, where a new binding arbitration tribunal has replaced the previous advisory commission, offering a potentially faster and more standardized path to restitution. The discussion will place these changes within the broader context of international norms like the Washington Principles and their varied implementation across jurisdictions.

The panel will help understand what it means to make something right when the loss was meant to erase history and confront the moral urgency and legal complexity of returning art stolen in the Nazi era—and ask how today's courts, commissions, and museums can move beyond defenses and delays to deliver remedies that feel like justice. To this end, speakers will delve into the legal, historical, and ethical dimensions of restitution, from navigating choice of law and limitations issues to building strong provenance files and structuring settlements that balance justice with stewardship. Attendees will gain practical insights into the use of U.S. litigation for repatriation, Germany's new arbitration process, the enforcement of cross border awards, and strategies for engaging with both national laws and international principles.




