Mariana Hogan has been on the faculty at New York Law School since 1992. She is currently the director of Advocacy Programs and she regularly teaches Trial Advocacy, Intensive Trial and Advocacy Skills, Deposition Skills, and Advocacy of Criminal Cases. She also serves as the Director of Externship Programs. Through that program she places students with judges and lawyers throughout New York City. Until 2014 she served as Associate Dean for Professional Development. In that role she was responsible for creating and teaching a professional development curriculum for the entire first year class; and, she oversaw all the non-academic aspects of student life. Professor Hogan has also taught Trial Advocacy at St. John's Law School, Pace University School of Law, Benjamin Cardozo Law School, and Wayne State Law School.

Professor Hogan is an active member of the New York bar. She has served on the Mayor's Advisory Committee on the Judiciary and on the Board of the New York County Lawyers' Association (NYCLA). In 2001 she was awarded the NYCLA CLE Institute Program Chair Award in recognition of her work in developing and sponsoring their annual Federal Criminal Practice Institute. She is a member of the Indigent Defense Organization Oversight Committee responsible for reporting to the Chief Judge of the local Appellate Division Court on the quality of indigent defense.

In addition to teaching for NITA, Professor Hogan is on the faculty of the New York City Office of Administrative Trials and Hearings. She is a member of the faculty for the New York City Law Department Annual Intensive Trial Advocacy Program, and she developed and runs an Intensive Trial Advocacy Program for lawyers at the New York City Human Resources Administration.

Professor Hogan began her career as a staff attorney in the Legal Aid Society's Criminal Defense Division in the South Bronx. During those early years she was in court everyday representing clients facing the full range of criminal charges. The demands of that practice developed her trial and advocacy skills. Later, she honed her skills working as a defense attorney in the Federal District Court for the Eastern District of New York. As a clinical law professor, Professor Hogan has handled civil



and criminal matters in the New York City courts, first at Pace University School of Law and then at New York Law School.
